Suzanne: Wow, that's really cool. No, it is! Olly and I are jealous, we really, that's a


dream for us to nurture and have a bonsai tree.

Andrew:

Yeah, it's really interesting how Instagram has evolved over the years, because when it first started, I used it to mainly connect with friends and family, right? To get photo updates about the people in my social network. These days, though, I'm mostly looking at content. What I mean by content is, you know, like videos made, I look at a lot of fitness videos people are posting. I look at restaurant reviews and, like, cooking Instagram accounts, restaurants in my city.

Suzanne: Me

Me too, love it for restaurants.

Andrew:

I've changed the way that I use Instagram. Of course, I still look at the pictures that my friends and family post. But I'm also looking at content that other people make as well.

Suzanne:

Absolutely, one thing I like is to check up on some hair salons and see their haircuts and colour that they post and get ideas for hairstyles. Sometimes they post videos, so I know how to do the hairstyles. Also, I really am into, like, you were talking about your new hobby. One of my hobbies is to do my nails and I really like nail art and nails like stickers like vinyl wraps, and they have lots of different designs, and sometimes to get ideas of how to do nail art or combine different patterns and different decorative nails. I will kinda search on Instagram for other people's ideas and I really like that. It's kind of a great resource for hobbyists and researching creative projects, too.

Andrew:

Absolutely, absolutely. I like it for fashion, as well. It's a great way to **peep** in on the new fashion trends.

Suzanne:

Totally.

Andrew:

Because, like I said, I've cemented my **old man status**, right? I've made it official. I got the bonsai tree. So you know I'm not hanging out with teenagers and 20-year-olds too much anymore. But I still like **to keep my ear to the ground** and see what's hip. So I can do that through Instagram.

Suzanne:

Totally. Also, I like to post pictures of my dog. I really love to post my dog pictures, with him in funny poses or wearing silly hats or weird costumes and doing funny tricks. I love it and I love to connect with other dog owners who appreciate that kind of thing. And I find it really funny. He's kind of like my little character, my main character of my Instagram account.

Andrew:

He's the hero of your Instagram account.



Suzanne: Totally. Skoshi in different environments with different clothing, and different

hats and accessories.

Andrew: Do you follow any celebrities on Instagram? I know that this is another really

popular aspect of Instagram, following celebrities.

Suzanne: I'm trying to think, do I follow celebrities? I'm gonna be real honest. I follow

people who maybe are widely known, meaning they have a lot of followers, but are not celebrities. Like maybe writers or maybe inspirational people, people that have maybe written inspirational books or have a podcast or are comedians. But not really celebrity—celebrities like Kim Kardashian or

anything like that, not Beyoncé ... I think I do follow Beyoncé.

Andrew: I follow Beyoncé.

Suzanne: I feel like everybody should follow Beyoncé. I mean what are you doing if

you're not following Beyoncé? Who are you following? But I usually find myself following people who are inspirational or influential in circles that I admire and I want to belong to. So it's not always celebrities but more, you

know, chefs or painters or writers, people like that.

Andrew: You know, it's funny that you mention Beyoncé because I think the only two

legit celebrities that I follow are Beyoncé and her sister Solange.

Suzanne: Oh yeah, Solange is awesome. I should totally follow her, yes.

Andrew: Yeah, those are the two straight-up celebrities that I follow but, like you, I

follow some people who are famous, but not like the Kardashians and all of

that nonsense. I don't need to surround myself with that.

Suzanne: Lord help us, no, yeah, exactly. But, like, people that are maybe, like, leaders

in their field, kind of, like maybe writers that are interesting or, yeah, some photographers too. I think I follow the photographer who was the White House

photographer for Obama.

Andrew: Oh, cool.

Suzanne: Yeah, things like that.

Andrew: So, we've talked a lot about the positive aspects of Instagram, how we can

stay up to date with fashion and hair trends, nail trends, restaurant reviews, all of these positive aspects. Can you think of anything that's a negative aspect of Instagram? What are some of the bad things associated with Insta?



Suzanne:

That's a really good question. I do think that Instagram is better than Facebook for this specific negative issue. However, I still think that it exists there and that is that I think that sometimes people post things that are just not real. They're staged or photoshopped or just a snippet of their day that makes it all look so happy and joyful and perfect. And the truth underneath is that it's not, and it's kind of a lie and kind of a little extra, you know? Like it's just a little too much and, quite frankly, it can make other people feel bad about their lives and make them feel jealous, like they need to get a life. And that sucks, I think. I think that kinda stinks when people feel bad about themselves. What do you think?

Andrew:

Yeah, totally agree with you, it can be bad for self-esteem or if you compare yourself to others, which is really easy to do on Instagram. You see somebody and, like you say, people usually only post the best parts of their day.

Suzanne:

Right.

Andrew:

Them looking their best, who knows how many photos someone had to take before they select the perfect selfie to post on Instagram. Then you see that person, ah, that person's so handsome or so beautiful. I wish I could be like him or her.

Suzanne:

Exactly.

Andrew:

So, yeah, this is a negative aspect. This doesn't affect me as much, I think. I think we both realize that, right? And once you're aware of it, it's not as influential on you.

Suzanne:

Right.

Andrew:

But the negative thing about Instagram for me is that it's a real **time suck**. You know?

Suzanne:

Yes.

Andrew:

I will **fire it up**, I'll open Instagram, and then 15 minutes can fly by and I'm like, oh my god, where did that 15 minutes go? I just totally wasted my time, scrolling through pictures.

Suzanne:

Yes, that's it. It's like you're constantly scrolling through a photo album instead of doing the homework you have to do, or checking the homework you have to check, right? And suddenly you add up those 15 minutes if you take 15 minutes from this hour and that hour and that hour. Finally, you might have a couple of hours in a day that you haven't been productive because you've been on Instagram. So yeah.



Andrew:

Oh yeah, I went as far as to install an app on my phone that restricts Instagram use. So I set it up that I could only open Instagram between noon and 1 p.m., during my lunch hour. And what ended up happening is that I was so busy eating lunch that I would always forget to use Instagram. So then later in the afternoon when I was a little bit bored of work and I wanted to take a break, I would try to open Instagram and it would be blocked and I would be like, "Ah man, I gotta wait till next lunch tomorrow to open it." So that was really great, it really stopped me from using it. But I have removed that now and I think I've gotten Instagram under control. I think I'm not an **addict** anymore.

Suzanne:

That's pretty intense to have an app just for that, that's pretty good. I think I could probably use that sometimes when I'm needing to get things done for a deadline. I could use something like that on my computer.

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Detailed Explanations

Old man status

Idiom, informal

In this episode, Andrew jokingly refers to cementing his **old man status**, though he is relatively young, because he got a bonsai tree. In this situation, Andrew is implying that taking care of a bonsai tree is an activity only old men do. While this is not a common expression, referring to oneself or others as an old man despite not being elderly is a common joke.

Vaugh: I've officially achieved **old man status**.

Trish: Why do you say that?

Vaugh: Since we found out that Patty is having twins, I sold my sports car and bought

a minivan.

Trish: Oh, yeah, you're definitely an old man now!

Carl: Where are you going?

Lenny: I'm thinking of going home. I can't stay out late anymore.

Carl: Because of your girlfriend?

Lenny: No, not at all. It's just, when I was in my 20s, sure, I'd party until 3 a.m. But

now that I'm in my 30s, I just don't have the drive to stay out all night.

Carl: Have you progressed to **old man status** already? We're the same age!

To baby (someone/something)

Verb

To baby is to treat someone or something like a baby. That can be good or bad. If you **baby** a plant, that means you are taking great care of it. But if you are treating your adult boyfriend or girlfriend like a baby, that's not so good!



Mother: Did you pack your toothbrush?

Daughter: Yes.

Mother: Did you pack your jacket and extra socks?

Daughter: Yes and yes! Mom, stop **babying me!** I'm an adult. I know how to prepare

for a trip!

John: Harry is coming over later with his dog. Is that all right?

Nancy: I guess. He's a bit annoying with that dog.

John: Why do you say that?

Nancy: He's always dressing it up, hugging it, talking to it in a high-pitched voice. He

babies it way too much.

John: Don't be so judgmental. That dog is all he has.

In certain circles

Idiomatic phrase

When you are referring to an unspecified group of people, you can say **in certain circles**. In this sense, certain means some and circle means a group of people who share something in common, like a profession, friendship, or interests.

Trevor: I think women hockey players should be playing alongside men.

Sarah: Yeah, I understand. But, **in certain circles**, there's this idea that if the best

women play in men's leagues, then the women's leagues won't develop as

much in popularity.

Trevor: OK, I see that point. Then which circle are you in?

Sarah: I want to develop the women's leagues.



Reporter: And what do you think about the current situation in the Far East?

Actress: Although it might be fashionable in certain circles to speak of politics in

public, I'd rather not.

Reporter: So you have no opinion on the matter?

Actress: I have many opinions, but I'd rather keep them to myself. Thank you.

To peep

Verb

To peep is to take a brief look at something. It can be used the same way you would say to take a peek at something.

Gary: I'm showing some of my artwork at the Black Cat Café this month. You should

swing by.

Cate: Actually, I took a quick **peep** inside. Looked great.

Gary: Thanks!

Cate: I was thinking of going again this Saturday. Would you like to go together?


Teacher: The reason I called you in today is because of your son, Johnny.

Parent: Oh, dear. What's the problem?

Teacher: The head teacher has found him twice now trying to **peep** into the girls'

locker room. This is a big problem.

Parent: I'm very sorry for this. I will have a long, hard talk with him tonight.



To keep one's ear to the ground

Idiom

If you are **keeping your ear to the ground**, it means you are listening to hear what's coming in the future. Think of how some animals can sense other animals or upcoming earthquakes by the vibration from the ground. For humans, it means keeping an eye out for new and upcoming things.

Sally: I love these dresses. They look so young and fresh.

Clark: Yeah, they're from the designer Betsey Johnson.

Sally: Oh, is she new?

Clark: Not quite! She's in her 70s.

Sally: Really? How does she stay so current?

Clark: I guess she keeps her ear to the ground.

Peter: How is Bitcoin trending today?

Dana: Upwards. It seems to be gaining a lot of value.

Peter: Good. That means other coins will too. Keep your ear to the ground and


look for good deals on the smaller coins.

Dana: Sure thing. I'll tell you what I find.

Legit

Adjective, informal

Legit is an abbreviation of the adjective legitimate. It can have two meanings: one, something is legal and acceptable; two, something is of genuinely good quality.



Crissy:	I can show my dad your drawings if you want. He's an architect.
Renee:	I thought you told me your father was a real estate agent.
Crissy:	He's that too. He changed professions, but he's still a legit architect.
Renee:	OK, then. If he could take a look and tell me what he thinks, that would be great!

Smith: Let's head over to Angkor for supper.

Vance: Angkor? What kind of restaurant is that?

Smith: Cambodian.

Vance: A Cambodian restaurant in Quebec City? How good could it be?

Smith: Trust me. It's **legit**! The cooking staff are all Cambodian. They ship their

ingredients over from Asia. Local Cambodians tell me it's the best in North

America.

Vance: All right, let's give it a shot.

Time suck

Noun, informal

A **time suck** is an activity that takes a lot of time to do. It's often seen as a waste of time. In this episode, Andrew that Instagram is a **time suck** for him. He would rather be doing something more productive with his time. You can think of the activity as figuratively sucking time out of your schedule.



Jill: Hey, I was wondering if you knew any good dentists. Who do you usually go

to?

Lee: I got Dr. Mendez to look after me. She's great. The only thing is that she's on

the other side of town.

Jill: Oh, that's not good.

Lee: Right. It takes me about an hour with no traffic. It's such a **time suck**.

Jill: Why don't you switch dentists?

Lee: She's really good. Decent rates. In the end, I guess it's worth it.

Greg: Wanna come out for a beer?

Val: Can't. Still correcting students' exams.

Greg: What? I finished mine last week. Oh, that's right. You don't give multiple

choice questions.

Val: I know. Correcting essay questions is a real **time suck**, but I find they're a

much better assessment tool.

Greg: All right, then. I'll be shooting darts and drinking beer with the others. Have

fun with those exams!

To fire (something) up

Idiom

In this episode, Andrew talks about **firing up** his Instagram; that means he is opening up the Instagram app. This idiom takes on the sense of starting something, just as you would set fire to charcoal to start your barbecue. You can also use it for turning on your computer, starting your car, or even, very informally, setting the pieces on a chess board before playing!



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Heath: I just bought an old-school Nintendo. Wanna play Tetris?

Cliff: Sure. Fire it up, and I'll go get some snacks.

Heath: All right. Are you any good?

Cliff: I might have won a few tournaments back in the day.

Patty: It's cold out today. Does your car heat up quickly?

Fran: Yeah, it's pretty good. I have a remote starter, so I usually **fire it up** a few

minutes before driving during the winter.

Patty: Your car is a little old. Did it come with a remote starter?

Fran: No, I had it installed. You should get that done too. It's great!

Addict

Noun

An **addict** is someone who is addicted to something. The term is often associated with drug **addicts**, but you can use it for people who really like coffee, social media, video games, reading, shopping, gambling, etc.

John: Where did you end up going for lunch yesterday?

Vera: Pizza Romano's.

John: Again?

Vera: Yeah, I know. I'm such an **addict**. The cheese is just so good. Have you ever

been?

John: Yes—once, with you. You don't remember?



Myra: Oh my god, I just wasted 2 hours on Facebook.

Mel: You definitely have a problem.

Myra: I gotta do something about it. Do you think there's a Facebook page for

Facebook addicts?

Mel: Um, maybe you should look into some outside help.

Yay or nay

Phrase

Yay or nay is an expression used when asking people whether they approve or disapprove of the topic at hand. **Yay** means yes/affirmative, **nay** means no/negative. It is an older way of asking people to choose yes or no.

Kelly: Do you want to see this movie or not?

Ben: Not sure. It looks all right, but I'm not excited about it.

Kelly: Well, decide. **Yay or nay**? It's starting in 5 minutes.

Ben: It's playing again in 2 hours. That buys me more time to think about it.

Kelly: No! Choose right now!

Chairperson: Now to vote on motion number 15. Would the board members in favour of

the motion please say yay.

Five members: Yay!

Chairperson: All those against, please say **nay**.

Four members: Nay!

Chairperson: The **yays** take it, five to four. The motion is passed.
